DEFINITION

A set is a well-defined collection of distinct objects, called elements. Sets can contain numbers, letters, or other sets.

KEY CONCEPTS

Types of Sets

Sets can be finite, infinite, empty, or universal, depending on the number of elements.

Set Notation

Sets are typically represented using curly braces, e.g., $A = \{1, 2, 3\}$.

Subset and Superset

A subset is a set where all elements are contained in another set, called a superset.

Union and Intersection

The union of sets combines all unique elements, while the intersection includes only common elements.

Venn Diagrams

Venn diagrams visually represent sets and their relationships, showing unions, intersections, and differences.

EXAMPLES

- Set $A = \{2, 4, 6\}$ and Set $B = \{4, 5, 6\}$ have an intersection of $\{4, 6\}$.
- The union of Set A and Set B is $\{2, 4, 5, 6\}$.
- Set $C = \{\}$ is an empty set.

MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Remember 'U' for union as it combines all elements, like a 'U' shape.
- ★ Think of 'I' for intersection as it connects only the common elements.
- ★ Use the phrase 'Subset is Smaller' to recall that a subset has fewer or equal elements.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Confusing union with intersection.
- ✗ Assuming all elements in a set are numbers only.
- ✗ Forgetting that sets do not include duplicate elements.
