- ★ Think of layers like a sandwich: the top layer is the most visible.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Neglecting to set the correct composition settings initially.
- ✗ Forgetting to save changes frequently, leading to lost work.
- ✗ Overcomplicating layer hierarchies, making it hard to manage animations.
