DEFINITION

Google Kubernetes Engine (GKE) is a managed service for running Kubernetes clusters on Google Cloud. It simplifies deploying, managing, and scaling containerized applications using Kubernetes.

KEY CONCEPTS

Kubernetes

An open-source platform for automating the deployment, scaling, and management of containerized applications.

Managed Service

GKE handles the underlying infrastructure, allowing developers to focus on application development without worrying about server management.

Containerization

A method of packaging applications and their dependencies into isolated units called containers, ensuring consistency across environments.

Scaling

GKE allows automatic scaling of applications based on demand, ensuring optimal resource usage and performance.

Load Balancing

Distributes incoming traffic across multiple instances of an application to ensure reliability and performance.

EXAMPLES

- Deploying a web application using GKE for automatic scaling.
- Using GKE to manage microservices architecture efficiently.
- Running batch processing jobs on GKE for data analysis.

- ✗ Assuming GKE automatically handles all aspects of Kubernetes without user input.
