DEFINITION

SAP Security involves safeguarding SAP systems and data from unauthorized access and threats. It ensures that only authorized users can access sensitive information and perform specific actions.

KEY CONCEPTS

User Roles

User roles define what actions a user can perform in SAP, controlling access to data.

Authorization Objects

Authorization objects are used to specify the permissions required for certain actions within SAP.

Profile Management

Profiles are collections of authorizations assigned to users, determining their access levels.

Audit Logs

Audit logs track user activities and changes in the system, helping to monitor security compliance.

Segregation of Duties

Segregation of duties ensures that no single user has control over all aspects of a critical process, reducing fraud risk.

EXAMPLES

- Creating a user role for finance department employees.
- Reviewing audit logs to identify unauthorized access attempts.
- Implementing segregation of duties in payroll processing.

MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Remember 'RAP' for Roles, Authorizations, Profiles in SAP Security.
- ★ Use 'SOD' to recall Segregation of Duties as a fraud prevention measure.
- ★ Think of 'AUP' for Audit logs, User roles, and Profiles.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Over-assigning permissions leading to security vulnerabilities.
- ✗ Neglecting regular reviews of user roles and authorizations.
- ✗ Failing to implement segregation of duties effectively.
