What is Pronouns

Pronouns: The Words That Replace Nouns!

DEFINITION

Pronouns are words that take the place of nouns to avoid repetition. They help make sentences clearer and more concise.

KEY CONCEPTS

Personal Pronouns

These refer to specific people or things, like 'I', 'you', 'he', 'she', 'it', 'we', and 'they'.

Reflexive Pronouns

These refer back to the subject of the sentence, such as 'myself', 'yourself', 'himself', 'herself', 'itself', 'ourselves', and 'themselves'.

Interrogative Pronouns

These are used to ask questions, including 'who', 'whom', 'whose', 'what', and 'which'.

Possessive Pronouns

These show ownership and include words like 'mine', 'yours', 'his', 'hers', 'its', 'ours', and 'theirs'.

Demonstrative Pronouns

These point to specific things or people, using words like 'this', 'that', 'these', and 'those'.

EXAMPLES

- She loves ice cream.
- This is my book.
- They are going to the park.

MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Remember 'P' for Personal, 'D' for Demonstrative - think of 'P' as People and 'D' as Directions.
- ★ Use the phrase 'My Pronouns' to recall types: Personal, Possessive, Reflexive, Demonstrative, Interrogative.
- ★ Think of pronouns as 'placeholders' for nouns to simplify sentences.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Confusing 'their' with 'there' or 'they're'.
- ✗ Using the wrong pronoun form, like 'him' instead of 'he'.
- ✗ Not matching the pronoun with the noun in number, like using 'they' for a singular noun.

QUICK RECAP
