

What is Sentence Structure

Unlock the Power of Sentence Structure!

DEFINITION

Sentence structure refers to the way words are arranged to create meaningful sentences. It includes the order of subjects, verbs, and objects.

KEY CONCEPTS

Subject

The subject is who or what the sentence is about, usually a noun or pronoun.

Predicate

The predicate tells what the subject does or is, usually containing a verb.

Object

The object receives the action of the verb, often answering 'what?' or 'whom?'.

Simple Sentence

A simple sentence contains one independent clause with a subject and a predicate.

Compound Sentence

A compound sentence consists of two independent clauses joined by a conjunction.

EXAMPLES

- The cat (subject) sleeps (predicate).
- I (subject) eat (predicate) an apple (object).
- She (subject) and he (subject) play (predicate) soccer (object).

MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Remember: SVO - Subject, Verb, Object for basic sentence structure.
- ★ Think of a sentence like a sandwich: the subject is the top slice, the predicate is the filling, and the object is the bottom slice.
- ★ Use the acronym 'SPO' to recall Subject, Predicate, Object.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Forgetting to include a subject in a sentence.
- ✗ Mixing up the order of words in a sentence.
- ✗ Using run-on sentences without proper conjunctions.
