Master the Basics of Scottish Gaelic Grammar!

DEFINITION

Scottish Gaelic grammar is the set of rules that govern how words are used in the language. Understanding these rules helps you form correct sentences and communicate effectively.

KEY CONCEPTS

Nouns

Nouns in Scottish Gaelic have genders, either masculine or feminine, which affect their form.

Adjectives

Adjectives agree with the nouns they describe in gender and number.

Prepositions

Prepositions often require specific cases, changing the form of the nouns that follow.

Verbs

Verbs change form based on tense and the subject, making conjugation essential.

Sentence Structure

The typical sentence structure is Verb-Subject-Object, differing from English.

EXAMPLES

- Tha mi a' leughadh leabhar. (I am reading a book.)
- Is e cat donn a th' ann. (It is a brown cat.)

MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Remember 'VSO' for Verb-Subject-Object structure.
- ★ Use colors to remember noun genders: blue for masculine, pink for feminine.
- ★ Create a song or rhyme for verb conjugations.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Confusing noun genders when using adjectives.
- ✗ Incorrect verb conjugation based on subject.
- ✗ Misplacing prepositions in sentences.
