DEFINITION

ASL grammar is the set of rules that govern how signs are structured and used. Understanding these rules helps you communicate clearly in American Sign Language.

KEY CONCEPTS

Word Order

ASL typically follows a Subject-Verb-Object structure, but can vary for emphasis.

Non-Manual Signals

Facial expressions and body movements enhance meaning and convey grammatical information.

Time Indicators

Time signs are placed at the beginning of a sentence to clarify when an action occurs.

Pronouns

Pronouns in ASL are often represented by pointing to the person or object being discussed.

Negation

Negation is expressed through specific signs or by shaking the head while signing.

EXAMPLES

- I (point) love (sign) pizza.
- Yesterday (sign), I (point) went (sign) to the store.
- She (point) doesn't (sign) like (sign) broccoli.

MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Remember the SVO structure by visualizing a simple sentence diagram.
- ★ Use facial expressions as a 'grammar tool' to remember non-manual signals.
- ★ Associate time indicators with a clock to visualize when actions happen.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Using incorrect word order, like placing the object before the subject.
- ✗ Neglecting to use facial expressions, leading to misunderstandings.
- ✗ Forgetting to establish time context before stating actions.
