DEFINITION

KEY CONCEPTS

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Mispronouncing vowel sounds by blending them together.
- ✗ Ignoring syllable stress, leading to unclear speech.
- ✗ Confusing similar-sounding consonants, like 'p' and 'b'.
