- ★ Use rhymes or songs to memorize difficult consonant clusters.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Mixing up tones leading to incorrect meanings.
- ✗ Mispronouncing vowel lengths, changing word meanings.
- ✗ Neglecting final consonants, resulting in unclear speech.
