DEFINITION

- ★ Associate bird calls with their visual appearance; for example, a bright red cardinal has a cheerful call.
- ★ Use rhymes or phrases that mimic the sound of the call to help remember it.
- ★ Practice listening to calls while watching videos or apps to connect sounds with visuals.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Confusing similar-sounding calls from different species.
- ✗ Not paying attention to the context in which a call is made.
- ✗ Neglecting to practice regularly, which can hinder memory retention.
