MEMORY TIPS

- ★ Think 'R.E.C.' for Reinforcement, Engagement, Consistency.
- ★ Use the acronym 'C.A.T.' for Calm, Assertive, Timely responses.
- ★ Visualize rewards as 'treats' for good behavior to reinforce positive actions.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Inconsistent commands leading to confusion.
- ✗ Using punishment instead of positive reinforcement.
- ✗ Failing to reward good behavior promptly.
