DEFINITION

Color theory is the study of how colors interact and how they can be combined. It helps artists create visually appealing artwork by understanding color relationships.

KEY CONCEPTS

Primary Colors

Tertiary Colors

- ★ Think of a fire for warm colors and a calm ocean for cool colors.
- ★ Use the phrase 'Primary is First' to recall primary colors.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Confusing primary and secondary colors.
- ✗ Overlooking the importance of color harmony.
- ✗ Neglecting the emotional impact of color choices.
