DEFINITION

- ★ Use the phrase 'Blend and Test' to emphasize the need for scent testing.

COMMON MISTAKES

- ✗ Using too much fragrance, which can lead to skin irritation.
- ✗ Not testing scents before adding them to the entire batch.
- ✗ Ignoring the effect of curing time on scent strength.
